THE FOUNDATION FOR IRANIAN STUDIES' annual prize of \$1000 for the best Ph.D. dissertation in the field of Iranian Studies has been awarded to Dr. Anne H. Betteridge for her dissertation entitled "Ziarat: Pilgrimage to the Shrines of Shiraz," submitted to the Department of Anthropology of the University of Chicago in March, 1985.

ISLAMIC TEACHING MATERIALS PROJECT -- The purpose of the project is to improve the quality and breadth of undergraduate course offerings in American colleges and universities by providing thoroughly-researched, concise and conveniently-formatted teaching aids on aspects of Islamic civilization to supplement existing curricula in art, architecture, comparative literature, religion, history, geography, archaeology, anthropology, and political science. In

addition, it will provide the materials and guidelines needed to develop a comprehensive course in Islamic civilization from the 7th century to the present. The project is sponsored by the American Council of Learned Societies and supported by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

The director of the project is Dr. Herbert L. Bodman, Jr., Professor of Islamic History, 554 Hamilton Hall, University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, NC 27514, 919/962-2115.

THE FOUNDATION FOR IRANIAN STUDIES announces a prize of \$1000 for the best Ph.D. dissertation in the field of Iranian Studies. All students completing their dissertations between July 1, 1985 and July 1, 1986 are eligible to apply for the 1986 prize.

Dissertations must be nominated by the author's advisor with a letter of acceptance for the degree accompanying the dissertation.

The deadline is August 30, 1986.

1986 MALCOM H. KERR DISSERTATION AWARDS — All students completing their dissertations between July 1, 1985 and July 1, 1986 are eligible to apply for the 1986 prizes. Dissertations must be nominated by the author's sponsor or advisor, with a letter of acceptance for the degree accompanying the manuscript. The applicant must specify the category for which he or she is applying: humanities or social sciences.

Only one copy of the dissertation need be submitted, although 2 or 3 copies will facilitate reading by the committee. The copies will be returned. Winners will be announced at the annual meeting in Boston. The winner of each category receives \$500.

The deadline for submission is August 1, 1986, although it is best to send the copies as early as possible.
