At this point, we cannot be more specific about the date because our negotiations for hotel accommodations and local arrangements are not yet final. As soon as we have more specific dates, I will write to you and give the details of the programming committee and the process of submitting your proposals, etc. But in the meantime, keep your mid-May of 1993 free of other engagements.

By now you must have received the ballots and the biographical sketches for the next round of SIS council elections. Please return these ballots by June 15th, 1992 to the SIS Election Committee, M.R. Ghanoonparvar, Center for Middle Eastern Studies, University of Texas, Austin, TX 78712. (SIS's international members should note that additional time will be allowed them to respond in order to accommodate the greater duration of overseas postal delivery.)

Abbas Amanat and Alice Hunsberger have written their respective reports on the conditions of our journal and the society's finances. I have nothing to add to these reports, except to say that the extremely difficult task of bringing us up-to-date with the publication of the journal is constantly on our mind and we will do everything we can to meet this challenge. We are encouraged by the response we have received from an array of distinguished scholars who have agreed to help us with this task.

The compilation and editing of this issue of the Newsletter have been by Jay Clark and Ben Weaver. We are grateful to them both.

## Report from the SIS Treasurer

At year end, the Society account stood on firmer fiscal ground than it had at any other point in the year. But activity throughout the twelve months highlighted the need for continued attention to both income and expenses.

While there has been a noticeable softening of membership numbers over the past few years, directly correlated to the lack of regular publication of the journal, interest and enthusiasmonthe part of the Society's members remains high. The renewal mailing in October successfully restored over \$3,000 in membership income. Early returns on our current 1992 membership drive show similar momentum.

In addition to the membership cycle, several members and friends of SIS made generous gifts totalling over \$10,000 toward the work of the Society. Some of these gifts show up in the Membership category, since the Society welcomed their contributors to its roster of Life Members, those members who have given gifts of \$500 or more at one time. Starting in 1992, the price of Life Membership is raised to \$1,000.

With this 1991 Report, the Treasurer is instituting a fiscal year based on the C.E. calender year, rather than a calender based on the "MESA-year," with its imprecise beginning and end

dates. While this change sets the stage for future comparative studies, it also makes sense in order to coordinate the fiscal year with the membership year. However, the next MESA report will reflect only 10 months of activity, rather than its usual 12.

With Journal and Newsletter responsibilities centralized into the hands of one editor each, the Society has already realized significant cost reductions this past year. The funds remaining in the account at year-end, however, represent the savings of not publishing two issues of the journal.

Society finances have not been immune to the economy at large. The interest rate on our checking account has fallen steadily throughout the year from 5.5% to 4%, and our endowment account from 7.1% to 5.5%. Inspite of these declines, interest income from checking and savings totalled \$543, while the endowment account (now standing at \$23,835) generated \$1,439. The Society spends neither the interest nor the capital of this endowment account, and depends primarily memberships and gifts for its day-to-day operating expenses.

## Report from the Iranian Studies Editor

Over the past quarter of a century there have been few journals like Iranian Studies entirely devoted to the study of the field. As an interdisciplinary quarterly it reflects a wide range of academic interests in humanities, social sciences, and current affairs and acts as a forum for presenting new research and new thinking. In defining the identity and the boundaries of the field and its place in relation to other areas of Middle Eastern, Islamic, and Asian studies, such a journal also demonstrates elements of continuity and change in the history and culture of the Iranian world.

The emergence of a new generation or Iranianists, in the United States, in Iran, and in other countries, the broadening of academic interests in fields previously under-represented, and the greater prescence of Persian-speaking communities outside Iran, from Samarquand to Southern California, make the task of the journal to represent the field even more crucial. More than a decade after the Islamic Revolution in Iran, and a relatively safe historical distance from the hurried appraisals of earlier years, a whole range of political and cultural issues call for serious and detached analysis. Moreover, obstacles in the way of research and publication in Iran and the set backs that scholarship has sustained because of ideological orientations, lack of resources, and a continuous brain drain underline *Iranian Studies*' task to promote serious learning and academic objectivity. On a more positive note, voluminous publications in today's Iran and abroad, which include texts and primary material as well as studies, require a forum to be introduced and evaluated.

As the new editor of Iranian Studies it will be impossible not to address some of the problems the journal is currently facing in achieving the above objectives. The most urgent is no doubt the journal's irregular publication schedule, a problem which I hope we will be able to rectify in the course of the next few issues. I am pleased to state that since September of last year there have been some very encouraging signs. In the first meeting of the new Editorial Board in November we tried to establish new guidlines concerning the journal's publication schedule and its standards as well as questions of style, format, and production. With the help of an ad hoc committee the journal also managed to secure some generous gifts from individuals and foundations in order to meet its immediate needs. As for the submissions since early this year we have received a very exciting collection of manuscripts indicative of new research in the field. Our inventory is gradually approaching an impressive level and includes diverse material reflecting the interdisciplinary nature of our journal. As such I very much hope that by the end of the current year we will be able to put out two or perhaps three double issues which will result in our being updated by 1993. The journal primarily tries to maintain diversity in its coverage and publish the latest research in all pertinent fields but it will also encourage some concentration. Two of the next four issues of the journal will be devoted to special themes, the first one on textile and another on the Riza Shah period.

The next three issues will also alleviate the backlog of bookreviews. Sharogh Akhavi, the journal's dedicated book-review editor, with the help of Ahmad Karimi-Hakkak who supervised book-reviews in Persian literature and language, ably covered virtually all publications related to Iranian studies. With exemplary patience and insight they solicited new titles from publishers, commissioned them to specialists, and strived for the speedy return of the reviews. With the cooperation of the Editorial Board, quality regular submissions. publication, larger and

readership, the journal will enhance its stature as a primary organ of the field.

Beyond the short-term schedule, some comments on the long-term strategy seem warranted. Encouraging the promising younger scholars to publish the results of their recent research provides them with a viable outlet to appear in print while allowing the journal to keep up with the new trends. Works of the established scholars, on the other hand, will guarantee continuity in the field and endurance of scholarly traditions. A healthy academic journal could not flourish without one or the other. There definitely room improvement in the areas of symposiums, critical essays and letters to the editor. The journal will try to provide greater exposure to relevant intellectual debates and methodological issues in the field. Senior scholars could write interpretive pieces in order to generate healthy discussions objective responses. The future of Iranian studies in American and European Universities, its relationship to other fields of Middle Eastern studies, and the pros and cons of "orientalism" in Iranian studies are a few examples.

Likewise, pre-modern and modern topics are equally

important for the future orientation of the journal, and maintaining a balance between the two remains a challenge. Iranian studies is a field with a long a substantial pre-Islamic scholarship and with two relatively younger Islamic and modern components. Although Iranian Studies will focus mainly on Islamic and particularly modern aspects, it will try to enrich its contribution by seeking viable dialogue with pre-Islamic scholarly interests. The editor will also try to maintain a fair balance between various fields of humanities and social sciences.

One of the priorities for the journal will be a greater devotion to international scholarship beyond the United States. In the past some steps were taken in that direction with more articles from European, Iranian, and Japanese scholars. Such an approach permits a broader intellectual forum with new new concerns and perspectives. Given the present obstacles in the way of research, the journal should give greater exposure to the state of scholarship in Iran, the current cultural environment and its problems, analysis of new academic publications, and availability of research material. As a sign of institutional support, Yale University, where the journal is now located, agreed to

provide an office for *Iranian Studies*, a complete computer and printer system, and some postal and communication privileges. In the long term, however, the production of the journal will improve by shifting from desktop publishing to printing and distribution by a university or commercial press. This may require, above all, more funds and hence subscription drives and various fund-raising activities.

Finally, the journal requires greater financial backing through the membership drive, regular payment of dues, as well as donations. The current estimate for a one-year, fourvolume production and distribution is about \$25,000. Although generous donations to the journal and the efforts of the Executive Secretary to improve the Society's finances are commendable, the journal nevertheless requires more funds to fill the remaining gaps and arrive at a comfortable financial balance.

I look forward to receiving from our readers their views and comments as well as their scholarly contributions.

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### The Asia Society

In celebration of the Persian new year festival of No Rooz. The Asia Society organised a threepart lecture series. Wednesday, March 18, Ehsan Yarshater, Professor Emeritus of Iranian Studies at Columbia University and director of the Center for Iranian Studies, introduced the series, while Farzaneh Milani, Assistant Professor of Persian langauge and literature at the University of Virginia, gave the first lecture entitled "Veils and Words: The Voices of Iranian Women Writers." At the second lecture on March 25, the distinguished scholar Shireen Mahdavi presented "Reflections in the Mirror: How Each Saw the Other - Women in the 19th Century." And for the third lecture on April 1, Haleh Esfandiari, a lecturer at the Department for Near Eastern Studies at Princeton, presented "Tearing Down the Walls: Iranian Women in the 20th Century."

## Columbia University Encyclopedia Iranica

The latest news of the Encyclopedia Iranica comes to us from the Iran Center at Columbia University and the Persian Heritage Foundation, a nonprofit organization committed to the promotion of Iranian studies, among them the Encyclopedia Iranica, the most important work on Iranian history and culture. The competent editorial staff of the Encyclopedia have recently been joined by Dr. John Walbridge and Dr. Philip Huvse who have been recruited as Assistant Editors. Other Assistant Editors are Dr. Ahmad Ashraf, Dr. Estelle Whelan, and Mr. Manouchehr Kasheff. They are assisted by an International Advisory Comittee and 34 Consulting Editors for the various disciplines. The Encyclopedia will be published in approximately sixteen volumes covering a wide range of topics on all aspects of Iranian civilization. The sixth fascicle of the fifth volume has just been published and work is well underway on the sixth volume. As it can be

imagined, funding of this monumental project is a tremendous task. The patronage of the National Endowment for the Humanities, an independent federal agency, and the support of the friends of the *Encyclopedia* has been essential.

As part of the fundraising efforts of the friends of the Encyclopedia, a benefit dinner committee has once again organized a gala black-tie dinner to be held in the elegant Rotunda of Columbia University on March 19th. Some might have attended the event last year which was so successfully chaired by Mrs. Maryam Ansary. This year's chairmen are Mrs. Layla Diba and Mrs. Leila Taghinia Heller.

The highlight of the evening promises to be the annual auction of paintings and sculptures donated by almost one hundred Iranian artists of different backgrounds and styles. The art committee, chaired by Mrs. Soudabeh Malek, received works from Iran, the United States, France, Canada, and other parts of the world, as artists enthusiastically welcomed the idea of helping an organization devoted to contributing to the cultural heritage of their country. Never before have the works of so many different Iranian artists been gathered on one occasion. Unfortunately, due to time constraints, only a limited number of these works will be

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auctioned on March 19th. The remainder will be sold at a special exhibition that will be held in late September at Columbia University.

Some five-thousand raffle tickets have been sold in conjuction with the benefit dinner and ticket holders patiently anticipated the drawing held in early March for some wonderful prizes, including contributions by Bijan and Hermes. Mr. Massoud Nader, also one of the vice-presidents of the Benefit Committee, has supervised this portion of the event and is largely responsible for the exciting gifts being given.

A catalogue consisting of over eighty advertisements has been put together by the new Junior Committee. The catalogue will be distributed among the 350 distinguished guests at the Gala and an additional 1000 copies are being mailed to select individuals and institutions. At latest count over twenty-thousand dollars has been raised by this project alone. The Junior Committee, sponsored by the Benefit Committee chairman, Leila Taghinia Heller, worked arduous hours in order to solicit advertisements from well established and reputable institutions and individuals. Dr. Nasr of BAF Printing generously donated his time for the long process of typesetting the advertisements, while Mr. Khansari of Line & Tone

Typografix guided the committee in publishing matters and graciously helped cover the publishing charges.

On February 13 Dr. Ahmad Pouri of Allameh Tabatabai University in Iran presented a lecture entitled "Poetry in Post-war Iran". The lecture was organised by the Department of Islamic and Middle Eastern Studies, University of Edinburgh.

### University of London

From March 23-25 the British Institute of Persian Studies and the SOAS Centre also held a conference entitled "Parthian and Sasanid Themes in Iranian Art and Archeology."

Since that time, Mr. Nabiev has become the new president and won a recent election renewing his presidency.

The Arabic script for writing Persian has been adopted as the official script of the country. New periodicals are ever arising in the new nation, among them the periodical <u>Somon</u> which belongs to The Foundation of the Tajik-Persian Language.

A new society named "Dustdaran-e Farhang-e Iran-e Bastan" has been established in Dushanbe. The members of this society are increasing on a daily basis.
